The team have still been suffering with vehicle related crime; these have been thefts from commercial vehicles and theft of number plates. Crime Overview

This section looks at the crimes of public interest that have occurred on the Rugby Rural Central Safer Neighbourhood Team policing area.

Below is a brief summary of some of the incidents that have been reported to us in the month of February:

Anti Social Behaviour – There has been 1 separate report of ASB in the Rugby Rural Central area.

- Incident 208 of the 19th February 2017 – Rugby Road, Binley Woods – Report of a male on an off-road bike riding along the path. Second call received from another IP saying this same bike has been seen in Brandon Woods.

Burglaries (Dwelling) – There have been 3 reports of Burglary Dwelling in the Rugby Central area.

- Incident 294 of the 1st February 2017 – Rugby Road, Binley Woods – Report that the IP has just disturbed two males inside his property. Males made of into the wooded area. Items stolen from within.
- Incident 258 of the 14th February 2017 – Craven Avenue, Binley Woods – Report that sometime between the 5th and 6th of February damage has been caused to a window and door. No entry gained into property and no items stolen.
- Incident 133 of the 20th February 2017 – Rugby Road, Binley Woods – Report that sometime on the 19th February unknown persons have tried to gain entry to a secure property. No entry gained.

Burglaries (Non Dwelling) – There has been 3 reports of Burglary (Non Dwelling) in the Rugby Rural Central Area.

- Incident 115 of the 5th February 2017 – Prentice Close, Long Lawford – Report that sometime overnight unknown persons have broken into a secure outbuilding and stolen belongings from within.
- Incident 235 of the 21st February 2017 – Stretton Road, Wolston – Report that IP has just got home and disturbed two males trying to steal a digger. On further inspection the house had been entered to steal the keys.
- Incident 35 of the 28th February 2017 – London Road, Ryton on Dunsmore – Report that sometime overnight known persons have broken into a secure cellar and stolen items from within.

Criminal Damage – There have been 2 reports of Criminal Damage in the Rugby Rural Central Area.


- Incident 374 of the 11th February 2017 – School Street, Wolston - Report that unknown offender has broken the door from an ATM machine.
- Incident 50 of the 15th February 2017 – London Road, Ryton on Dunsmore – Report that unknown offenders overnight have applied superglue to the padlocks on the informants property.

Theft – There have been 4 reports of Theft in the Rugby Rural Central Area.

- Incident 313 of the 1st February 2017 – Leamington Road, Ryton on Dunsmore – report that sometime between 1730 and 1830 unknown offenders have entered an unattended bag and stolen phone, charger and wallet.
- Incident 182 of the 5th February 2017 – Rugby Road, Binley Woods – Report that unknown offenders have between 1050am and 12pm, entered a insecure locker room and stolen a phone from an unattended bag
- Incident 251 of the 13th February 2017 – Grange Terrace, Long Lawford – Report that sometime between 2nd and 3rd of February 2017 unknown persons have stolen a child's cycle from the garden.
- Incident 33 of the 17th February 2017 – Avondale Road, Brandon – Report that sometime overnight unknown offenders have stolen the informant's trailer.

Vehicle Crime – There have been 11 separate reports of vehicle crime in the Rugby Rural Central Area.

- Incident 33 of the 7th February 2017 – Manor Estate, Wolston – Report that sometime overnight unknown offenders have broken into a secure van and stolen tools
- Incident 120 of the 11th February 2017 – Steeping Road, Long Lawford – Report that unknown offenders have stolen a spare wheel from under a 4x4 vehicle.
- Incident 452 of the 14th February 2017 – Priory Road, Wolston – Sometime in the afternoon unknown persons have tried to steal the IP's number plates.
- Incident 72 of the 14th February 2017 – Abbots Walk, Wolston – Sometime overnight unknown persons have stolen
- Incident 129 of the 19th February 2017 – Rugby Road, Binley Woods – Report that sometime overnight unknown offenders have removed the electric wing mirror causing damage.
- Incident 175 of the 20 February 2017 – Prologis Park, Ryton on Dunsmore – Report that sometime between 6th and 9th February 2017, unknown offenders have stolen a spare wheel from a parked secure 4x4 vehicle.
- Incident 180 of the 20th February 2017 – Bluemels Drive, Wolston – Report that sometime overnight unknown offenders have stolen a spare wheel from a parked secure 4x4 vehicle.
- Incident 170 of the 21st February 2017 – Fosse Cottages, Bretford – Sometime overnight unknown offenders have forced entry to a secure vehicle and stolen tools from within.
- Incident 295 of the 21st February 2017 – Tee Tong Road, Long Lawford – Report that sometime over the prior two days, unknown offenders have stolen number plates from a parked secure vehicle.
- Incident 306 of the 21st February 2017 – Tee Tong Road, Long Lawford – Report that sometime overnight unknown offenders have stolen both sets of number plates from a parked secure vehicle.
- Incident 328 of the 24th February 2017 – Redhill Road, Long Lawford – Informant reporting that unknown persons have broken into a secure vehicle. Items left behind from offender and investigation ongoing.

Rugby Rural Central team Priorities

New Policing priorities have been set for the Rugby Rural Central Team at the latest Community Forum held the 16th February 2017 at the Binley Woods Village Hall. The team suggested the below priorities and online voting ran between the 1st February 2017 and 14th February 2017, below are the results;-

- Proactive patrols to reduce theft of number plates in the Wolston and Long Lawford area: - 48%
- Proactive patrols in the RRC area to reduce theft from commercial vehicles: - 26%
- Speed checks on the Leamington Road, Ryton on Dunsmore: - 4%
- Utilisation of ANPR in the Binley Woods area: - 22%

The team have adopted the below priorities for the following three months

- Proactive patrols to reduce theft of number plates in the Wolston and Long Lawford area.
- Proactive patrols in the RRC area to reduce theft from commercial vehicles.

Although these are currently the main SNT priorities, we will continue to monitor any issues that have been raised previously.

Are you putting your children at risk?

The team have been contacted by concerned residents about parking of parents at school times in the Rugby Rural Central area. We will be asking schools to send out a message to parents.




If you need to drive your child to school, for the safety of your child, their friends and the local community we request that you park safely, legally and considerately.



- ‘School Keep Clear’ restrictions ensure clear sight lines for motorists and children. No vehicle, even blue badge holders, are permitted to stop
- You should not park on the pavement or grass verge. Obstructing the verge or footway can amount to a criminal offence if the passage of pedestrians is significantly impeded.
- Consider parking further away from the school and walking the last 5 or 10 minutes walking to school is good for your health, means less congestion outside schools, improving air quality and safety around your school

Think before you park!

Illegal and irresponsible parking can put lives in danger.
Remember the following:

 <p style="text-align: center;">Parking at restricted times only.</p>	 <p style="text-align: center;">Parking on footpaths/corners/junctions creates a dangerous obstruction to pedestrians and other drivers.</p>

If you choose to ignore this advice you may be prosecuted.
The safety of your and other people's children is far more important than finding a close spot to leave your car. Always think before you park.



Child Sexual Exploitation Awareness day 18th March

The 18th March is the National Child Sexual Exploitation Awareness Day and the Rugby Rural Central team would like your support in taking the time to, stop and speak out if you think that something is not right.

CSE is a form of sexual abuse that can affect any child, anytime, anywhere – regardless of their social or ethnic background.



Is your child or friend... regularly missing from home or school, receiving lots of texts or phone calls prior to leaving, Changing in physical appearance or personal hygiene, experiencing low self-esteem or self harming

Have you noticed...A change in behaviour – becoming aggressive and disruptive or quiet and withdrawn, Unexplained gifts of new possessions such as clothes, jewellery, mobile phones or money that can't be accounted for, Increase in the amount of time spent online and/or secretive use of the internet, A new boyfriend, girlfriend or lots of new friends, Sudden involvement in criminal behaviour or increased offending, physical symptoms or infections such as bruising, bite marks, sexually transmitted infections, evidence or suspicion of substance misuse (drugs, alcohol or lethal highs)

PCSO Havelock says "A sudden change in your child's behaviour can be a sign that something is not right. Take the time to ask them if all is ok? If you still have concerns then speaking to a member of our team may help"

If you think something's not right –chances are you are right!

PCSO responds to tweet about bad parking

PCSO Havelock saw a tweet on the Ryton Village twitter page and during that evenings patrol he saw the same vehicle blocking the entire pavement on High Street. PCSO Havelock agreed with the tweet that the vehicle had parked on an unlit road obstructing the pavement fully. PCSO Havelock reported the vehicle for obstructive parking and the vehicle was owner was fined £30.

PCSO Matt Havelock was on patrol of High Street, Ryton on Dunsmore on the 9th February, when a vehicle caught the officer's eye. PCSO Havelock checked the car on the Police National Computer and found that the car had no insurance. PCSO Havelock was shortly joined by another police unit and the vehicle was stopped and whilst speaking to the driver the car was also found to have no tax. The driver was reported for these offences and the car seized.






Vehicle seizures with the help of ANPR

Throughout the month of February 2017 the rural central team have been utilizing the Automatic Number Plate Recognition system based in Binley woods. The camera reads all vehicles entering and leaving the village. The team are notified by the system when vehicles that have no tax, no Insurance or intelligence markers added by police. With the notification officers can look for the offending vehicle and get them stopped. Below are a few vehicles that the team have stopped and seized.
