In 2007 an Antarctica cruise ship sank and our speaker this month, Georgina Hale, was actually on deck filming when the ship was damaged. Shortly after the collision the captain instructed all passengers to dress in warm clothing and lifejackets and assemble on deck. Georgina also had the foresight to empty a drawer containing phone, house and car keys etc. into a bag which proved very useful. Other passengers had problems because they had lost these items. During the evacuation to the lifeboats everyone kept calm and for the four and half hours they were in the lifeboat they sat in silence. The survivors were surprised and overwhelmed by the amount of publicity that greeted them when they arrived in Chile. From the time another cruise ship rescued them until they boarded the plane to go home, everyone was very considerate. They appreciated having a store opened for them so that they could have a change of clothing because they had been in the same clothes for three days. Georgina said the money she raises is to give a 'treat' to people who are having a difficult time. She gave the example of paying for a "hen weekend" for a young girl who was upset about losing her hair when having chemotherapy.
