One of her main aims was to create clothing for young people in which their movement was not restricted. She also made a lot of bisexual items and many famous names wore them. She showed us a jacket the same style worn by John Lennon. The mini skirt and hot pants were accredited to her and she designed patterned tights to wear with them.

Although we do not have a meeting in August we will be holding an afternoon tea at Eileen Yates' home so again we are hoping the weather is kind to us.
