Lots of people still drive down the School Lane. It is very dangerous for the children and there have been quite a few near misses. A permanent solution to block access is needed urgently

Difficulty parking by the Co-op

Congestion in School Street and by Co-op. Speed of traffic passing through village

Congestion in School Street and by Co-op. Speed of traffic through the village, quarry traffic

School Street should have off road parking or only 1 side of the road allowing parking, to make it less of a slalom / Parking on zig zag, double yellow lines, corners and in junctions should be policed and stopped e.g. people parking in the junction of the Baptist church and by school

Cars parking on opposite side of the road on the pavement (which is illegal) which interferes with access to us using our own drive and family members visiting have difficulty also

Constant issues with other cars blocking drive access or ease of access to property drive

People park very inconsiderately when going into the Co-op and block the entry

Lack of parking spaces near shops

The recent alteration to the frontage at the cemetery has not worked out and the increased parking by users of the playing field causes major problems to road users to the cemetery

Parking on pavements

Getting through School Street in a car or even trying to park is a challenge (needs a layby)

Parking on Bluemels estate often dangerous, no room for emergency vehicles to get past. Inconsiderate/sloppy parking. Not enough spaces for large properties

Very limited parking for local shopping area. Dropped kerbs not marked on road

Danger of heavy congestion in Main Street caused by parking both of residents and cars being parked by parents dropping off children. This is an accident waiting to happen. Large volume of aggressively driven cars - too fast. This has become a rat run ever since the tollbar island major road works. A lot of drivers have got used to coming through the village in both directions - nightmare at school times Inadequate parking for shops, passing trade park wherever they like. Footpaths are blocked and sometimes make it impossible for prams, pushchairs, pedestrians etc to pass

Often all spaces in front of Co-op are full - need more spaces also often the chemists van uses space If the half-moon car park could be made into a public car park, it would ease parking for the Co-op, post office and pharmacy

Parking outside Co-op and fish bar causes traffic can be difficult to navigate

Very congested streets, slows people down, but awkward for buses/farm vehicles to pass

Parking on pavements

Parking outside Co-op should be for disabled only. People parking and manoeuvring there makes the junction dangerous / School parents clog up Manor Estate/Paddock Close corner

Resident only parking on Main Street

Need more parking in surgery and for local shop

Need more parking for surgery and shops

Number of vehicles road parked within village / Parking within approaches to pedestrian crossing (School Street/Warwick Road)

Lack of parking by the shops. Selfish parking making it difficult for other vehicles to freely pass

Please get CCTV to work at the shops to stop cars parking dangerously on the zig zag

There are lots of busy through roads and parking on these is common (and often necessary). However, the parking causes hold ups and potential road safety issues

Limited parking for shops and doctors, chip shop so end up parking on street which is not good. Path to school as cars drive down it and no footpath for kids

Most drivers may not have a good spacial awareness when driving with cars parked on both sides of the world

Reduced visibility because of inconsiderate parking

Cars squeeze past so fast on the road, delivery vans sometimes block our drive and our kerb is so high it scrapes the car underside occasionally

Parking outside shops

There is terrible parking in village. I have been blocked in countless times going to local shop

We personally don't have but understand concerns of parking on bends etc and availability on School Street

More of an issue in all cases if responsible for ferrying someone into village centre for shopping, medical appointments etc

Although nobody ought to park on pavements we wouldn't manage if they didn't.

Parking for village facilities is very restricted, limited on road parking. Doctors surgery is becoming inadequate with more people parking on the road.

Car drivers should not park opposite an already parked vehicle. This obstruction causes great difficulty getting along a road.

Limited parking availability at peak times at school, shops etc. Parking can clog up centre of village at peak times.

The parking spaces in the centre of the village do not meet the needs of the populous. Parking in the school area is also not meeting current needs.

There is a continuous nuisance caused by a few inconsiderate people in School Street who park on the pavement sometimes completely blocking it.

If cars park both sides on a narrow entrance, residents cannot get in or out and certainly large vehicles e.g. dust carts and commercial vans cannot enter.

I no longer drive to the co-op, find that other drivers park inconsiderately over zebra crossings etc, they are often inconsiderate to others - both drivers and pedestrians.

Impact of poor parking around village centre (Co-op and Doctors)

Too many people park inconsiderately in village, preventing free flow of traffic through village, especially around Co-Op.

Roads too narrow to have kerbside parking

Traffic often backs up due to on road parking (especially when e.g. buses passing through). Parked cars near doctors reduce visibility pulling out/in. Near Co-op doors open, manoeuvre and sometimes risks and distract from pedestrian crossing.

Too many cars, not enough parking spaces for houses - resulting in poor/dangerous parking, especially along school streets.

We have no driveway parking and parking in communal area not always available. We, and visitors, often park on the road, due to the reason stated above. Also, unused vehicles used as storage locations are left in communal parking areas.

There is generally a huge shortage of convenient, safe parking in Wolston.

Too much parking of cars on the road i.e. mums at school, doctors not enough availability.

I probably have ticked no concerns as I currently can't drive as I'm ill.

Not enough safe legal parking outside Co-op. Also, insufficient parking along School Street which makes travel difficult at certain times of the day. Need to change some of the verges into parking spaces.

Provision for general parking. Parking for young children (in/out school) currently roadside. No designated parking for visitors.

Provision of parking. School parking for parents bringing and picking up children is done on main roadside. No designated parking for visitors who have to come to village.

Co-op parking is poor and the delivery lorries are too big for this village.

Car being parked illegally

There is a lot of unnecessary parking for dropping off children for school. Always difficult to park near the shops. I walk there for small amounts, but if you are passing, or have more to get, it would be useful to be able to park close.

Vehicles travel too fast down School Street, lorry, diggers, cars causing concerns that someone will be hurt.

Habitual parking on pedestrian area. Double parking on road and parking on pavement in Main Street. There needs to be increased provision for parking near the shops due to the increase in traffic caused by extra housing built recently in the village.

Businesses using village parking spaces for the use of their customers. HGV's overnight parking in residential area causing possible damage to footpaths

Parking allowed on both sides of School Street

Parking too close to zebra crossing, School Street/Warwick Road blocking off Brook Street

People park poorly and use too much space

Bennett Court need designated car parking

Parking is ok, but roads are narrow in places which can make passing a problem

An accident waiting to happen - School Street and village centre congestion. Too much traffic using the village as cut through, speeding is an issue too

School parking on the narrow corner in Paddocks Close. Parking at Co-op limited

Parking on pavements

Double parking and parking on pavements

Parking on verges - dangerous infrastructure

Not enough parking spaces near Wolston School and too dangerous to park in school grounds, leaving parents with a lack of suitable places to park

Parking outside of shops / Parking when dropping children for school / Parking along Main Street - chip shop

Main problem area School Street

On road parking throughout the village and cars half blocking pavements

Chip shop parking and rudeness when asking customers to 'please move your vehicle'

Parking is now a problem anywhere. At times, the centre of Wolston, especially Main and School Street are chaotic. Surely only a matter of time until there is a serious accident

Very few car parking spaces for visitors to Wolston i.e. near the centre of the village green. Parking on pavements and grass verges forcing pedestrians into the road. Parking at school times causing obstructions both for pedestrians and cars

Generally cars being parked illegally

When people visiting GP blocking your driveway

Visitors do not seem to know how to park their cars on the block paved areas and often, half on the road - blocking/narrowing the passing width for passing traffic. Inconsiderate shopper parking - blocking others in or parking on zig zags or across locals drives

Most of the problems caused by car drivers who could have walked

Parking on School Street around Co-op and doctors is always really busy and tight on space. Often see cars with missing wing mirrors

Some people on Bluemels estate have parking spaces behind their property but don't always use them, instead they park outside other people's property forcing owners elsewhere also no thought for emergency vehicles. Visitors and food deliveries blocking drives/parking in drives of others

Where I live, idiots park to go to the Co-op, chip shop, collect kids from school or go to the Rose & Crown meaning that I, as a resident in Main Street, current park at all outside my home

People need to respect others driveways, entrances etc I worry about the safety when parking outside the shops

The white zig zag lines by the Co-op crossing need re painting and policing as everyone tends to park on them, including the Royal Mail vans at 5pm most nights

Cars blocking entrance generally only happens when an event on the Avon takes place. Negotiating the village at the beginning and end of the school day is like playing dodgems cars, both moving and parked, plus pedestrians. It is a pity the paths are so narrow around the school, but there is nothing that can be done about this

School Street is always a problem with vehicles parked on either side. Also, the moronic few who park on the zig zags on the crossing by the Co-op

Stops need to take to stop people parking on zebra crossing - safety concern

Too many parents using church car park am/pm

Parents parking to collect children from school parking on zig zag lines and double parking / Lack of parking space at doctors surgery / Parking to shop in village

Availability in the centre of the village

To take my elderly mother out and cars often prevent access

Very little parking at school

Parking near road entrances and on blind corners on the estates

Inconsiderate parking at school times

Parking on the corner of roads

People using the school (St Margaret's) road up to the school to drop off their children, instead of walking. Dangerous. Vehicles should be banned

School Street

At the end of Main Street. The Street can be a bit of a tight squeeze for buses and cars due to parking

There is never anywhere to park outside the Co-op

Only safe parking is Half Moon pub when available

As stated earlier there are insufficient parking spaces at Bennett Court

When we are walking round village there are lots of cars parked on pavements that you have to walk on road. Car parked on grass verge make village look poor and damage glass

People parking on bridge / Main Street for Co-op and chippy

Stopped using Co-op as can never park

Didn't use Co-op as nowhere to park

Often very little room on pavement especially if you are walking with a pram or buggy.

Parking around the Co-op is limited and people park dangerously and selfishly

Very little parking for local shop and Wolston surgery

Shop parking atrocious. Too many residents parking half on pavement, half on the road.

Pavements frequently blocked, impassable for the disabled or pushchairs. Hazardous exit of our own drive due to dangerous parking by patients at Doctors.

Chronic lack of parking spaces in centre of Wolston.

Parking at the Co-op makes pulling out of the T junction very difficult. It's very difficult to watch out for all possible options.

People daily parking over our drive. School parking - the difficulty to pass badly parked cars on foot and in car - particularly the worry of children getting out of cars straight into the road.

Regularly in Main Street. Outside shops - parking on zig zags, especially women with young children in cars

I would appreciate parking to be provided, especially school parking, also for general parking area.

Car theft. Over use of historic bridges over the brook for school parking (parents)

Parking outside school a nightmare. Co-op needs a car park.

Vehicles parking on zig zags by crossing at shops. I have seen vehicles parked on zig zags and police vehicles have driven by and not taken any notice.

Would like to have parking area for visitors to the village.

As only parking is a layby, which is near enough full when all residents are in. Any visitors push out residents. Also, people leave cars, then off for the day or more. Trouble parking at doctors and shops.

Cars park on grass verges

People park over my drive access, can't get in or out.

Brook St Garage customers regularly block the road for residents' access. Co-op shoppers regularly park on zig zag lines often blocking the view of the pedestrian crossing - very dangerous.

Parking in the Church Field Drive is dangerous. Parking half on the pavements.

Insufficient parking off road for school traffic. Parking behind village hall is not used by parents. Parking in church drive is hazardous i.e. passes the school entrance.

Cars parked all along School Street, bus/lorry very difficult to pass, cars then tend to park half on pavement.

Quite often blocked in by people as live next to village hall, however this is driver stupidity as there are parking spaces behind.

Cars parking in the village tends to be heavy and also cars parked in Main Street/School Street are a hazard for traffic.

There is not enough room to get two vehicles by on some roads, cars are parked on both sides.

In our Close people park on pavements, we can't walk on paths because hedges have grown over the paths. We have to walk in the road at times.

Blocking my entrance to drive. Parking on the grass verge.

At times of "drop off" and "collecting" at school, the build-up of cars parking is dangerous. Little opportunity to park to shop at Co-op/chemist

Neighbours with more vehicles than they have spaces park them on their own frontage, some fairly regular use of the street to repair/modify vehicles.

Something needs to be done about the parking problems in the middle of Wolston.

Potential for accidents as I can pull out around parked up cars.

Lack of parking in centre of Wolston. Too many people use car for shopping - not prepared to walk short distance.

Parking on zig zag lines

Main Street gets very congested by customers visiting chip shop and/ or deli

Any new builds should have at least 2 parking spaces to each property

Limited parking at surgery

Always difficult to park near Co-op, pharmacy, doctors, through traffic has to zig zag between parked cars in Main Road and School Street

No concerns

Lack of available parking only encourage travelling to shopping centre where there is parking Cars parking too close to junctions - right on the corner - Priory Road. School Street, parking on both sides makes it difficult. Parking for Co-op not sufficient - people park on crossing.

Lack of parking in centre of village

Nowhere to park in centre of Wolston. A solution needs to be found about lack of parking in centre of Wolston and School Street.

Not enough parking for local shopping. School Street is awfully double parked.

Parking outside the shop, along by the doctors and on Main Street, causing blockages, especially for bus. Very inconsiderate in a lot of cases.

Sometimes I would like to be able to park near the Co-op but there is very frequently no spaces. Normally I walk there from my home but when returning home from a holiday, I would like to call into the Co-op to get essential supplies.

Cars parking on/off pavements, when there are grassy areas, own by council? That could be used to mark lined off. Road parking for residents.

Lazy people parking where not allowed

Cars near the school are a hazard during school runs

Would shop more locally if easily accessible from car park

More parking required to encourage use of shops

Makes certain roads difficult to negotiate safely

Cars parked on zig zags, cars blocking view and passage for others

School Street is clearly an issue

People have got out of the habit of walking

Walking in Wolston with a buggy or wheelchair (we do both) can be dangerous because the parked cars block the pavements

Some main roads have too many cars parked on the road

The school parking is dangerous as children have to walk on the lane, no proper pathway to school. Parking when events on at scout hut is ridiculous - hap hazard. Parking on pavement and blocking drives

Parking on grass verges - damage grass and can't maintain

Parking for shops is very poor, especially as it is also by a junction

Security of property, garage and car attempted theft recently

Bennett Court - limited parking

Bennetts Court/Warwick Road not enough parking for amount of residents let alone nurses/doctors and visitors need urgent attention

Often can't park where I live at Bennett Court when visitors and council workers visit. Especially because it's vulnerable people, old and disabled

Pathways blocked by bad parking, obstructing views when coming out of junctions, and causing jams in Main Street

Lammas Court very congested when sports or kids clubs are on in the park

Parking for the shop is dangerous as it is on the junction

Parking by the Co-op isn't sufficient and people parking too close to the pelican crossing makes it dangerous

Especially School Street maybe if some of grass verge was taken away, cars would be able to park off the road

Ridiculously small car parking spaces in car park by garage (when available) not helped by camper van usually being there. Parking outside Co-op is disorganised and being opposite junction dangerous to enter and exit

Park in the centre of the village is a major problem, with people dumping their cars wherever they like. Also cars parking on a blind bend in Paddocks Close so they can do school run, surely they can walk

Garage man takes up public parking spaces

People not parking on their drives as the family has four cars, only spaces for two, bigger problems when visitors arrive

Yellow lines on Main Street (brook side) at junction of School Street needed to stop irresponsible parking

People driving and parking dangerously during school drop offs and pickups. There are nearly not enough parking spaces at these times. Not enough parking by the Co-op this also becomes dangerous

People parking on zig zag lines by zebra crossing

People parking on zig zag lines near shops

Vehicles are constantly parked outside my house, and as it is adjacent to a busy road junction is a potential hazard

Parking near the Co-op and for the doctor's surgery is extremely limited. The area outside the Co-op and towards the zebra crossing is a nightmare when busy

People parking on restricted lines by shops. Coaches picking up and dropping off school children. Garage parking customers vehicles all over village

Poor parking provision and enforcement along main routes through village. Parking required at shops. Better/clearer road markings

Always struggle to get a space to go to the Co-op

It annoys me that people park near the school at drop off and pick up as its dangerous, other than that I've no parking concerns

Too many cars are going by school and is dangerous for children who are walking

People should not drive to the school. If they have to, they should use designated parking and not the church car park

School Street parking - obstacle course for cars travelling through

We have experienced being blocked in by cars parked in front of our drive. Parking for school drop off / pick up created problems on main streets

People buying homes with one car space and then expecting to park 2 or 3

School parking is a problem as too many people drive their children to school. Living in the village I only drive if going outside the villages, otherwise I walk

School Street is a prime example of cars parking on the main route through the village creating impatience as motorists rush to get through

Residents more than 2 cars monopolizing the spaces

Congestion and inconsiderate parking at school times can be inconvenient and sometimes dangerous. Insufficient parking can cause congestion and friction! Limited parking for shopping can be a problem for people with disabilities

Parking at surgery is very limited and difficult by shops

Parking for residents of School Street and parking for the Co-op (nb the Co-op should probably be resited)

Parking on zig zags outside Co-op

By Co-op parking, it really slows traffic, then people speed down Meadow Road to avoid

There are areas of the village without enough parking. A larger village car park would be great

Parking at school times is a real concern, cars parked both sides of road outside school sometimes on yellow zig zags. Cars driving down to school to park dangerous for children walking to school

Very difficult to park near shops

Difficult parking at Co-op. Congestion in residential roads from parking in the road

Parking both side of Main Street. At school closing time

More spaces needed in village centre for shoppers to keep roads flowing

School parking blocks the road for through traffic shortage of parking

Very narrow roads on Main and School Street, high volume of traffic passing through the village who do not live there

People park anywhere along School Street to go to medical centre, even parking across driveways

Excessive and inconsiderate parking by garage staff, suppliers and customers

The garage uses most spaces in Brook Street during the day. Use of Belinda's deli, chemist and co-op during the day. Hard to park, chip shop in evening bad parking also. Cars from Main Street, School Street and Warwick Street limit 20mph.

Just no parking

Cars should not be allowed to drive in front of the school at drop off and pick up unless they have a blue badge.

Nowhere to park near the shop and bad parking. Parking on School Street/i.e. from the surgery down to the old school building

People park on yellow zig zag lines by war memorial. It's dangerous, plus makes access to school and church more difficult.

There has been no increase in the amount of parking in the village relative to the expansion of the village to the size of a small town.

The centre of the village is becoming increasingly congested and there is not sufficient parking.

Parking on pavements, people visiting the surgery. Concerns for access for emergency vehicles through the village. Residents using grassed areas/pavements to park their vehicles.

Parked vehicles cause a hazard near the shop, often covering the crossing zig zags.

There should be parking only on one side of the road down Main Street including the road by the bridge out of Wolston and particularly the end of the chevron by the road to the school.

Wolston now a rat run to A45

Pavements often blocked and our own driveway is hazardous to exit

People are selfish and just leave their cars, blocking entrances so they don't have to walk far to their destination.

Nowhere to park in Wolston - other than on main road.

School Street parking

There is no off street car park available in the village!!

Traffic congestion in village/lack of available parking space

This issue is due to the planning of Bluemels Drive. Having 4-6 bedroom houses with 1 or 2 parking spaces per house.

Generally limited parking but all neighbours are considerate. Becomes challenging when neighbours have visitors. I like the fact that having to give way around parked cars, slows the traffic down - speeding is an issue on our road.

Paragon housing has recently expressed concern that tenants (home owners) are parking / have created parking spaces in front of their homes. If this is enforced and householders have to park elsewhere, this will be a major problem - Abbots Walk/Meadow Road

Wolston church and Church Field. The cottages on Main Street both sides of the road. The bridge and river as you enter the village from Brandon.

Smaller shops e.g. fruit and veg shop, bakery, restaurant, cafe, laundrette etc One shop with insufficient parking isn't enough, competition would be good

Another food outlet in Main Street

Try and give priority to local people being employed with the existing local businesses, pubs, shops and hotel

Local suppliers e.g. florist, bakery, butchers, more small eateries e.g. cafe/coffee shops. Bills deli only appeals to tradespeople not walkers etc as nowhere to sit. Need to allow small scale seating outside
